

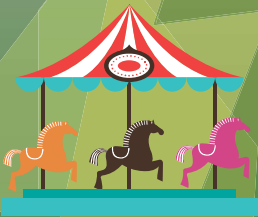

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Letter from the Fair Manager

Greetings Fairgoers!

Coconino County Parks & Recreation is in planning mode for the upcoming Coconino County Fair. We have several initiatives underway, including vendor recruitment, booking entertainment, finishing up this Fair Book, and working on adjusting the fees and flow of the Fair. It's a busy time at Fort Tuthill County Park, but with that comes a lot of excitement as we get closer and closer to Labor Day Weekend.



The theme of this year's letter (yes, they usually have a theme) is tradition. The Coconino County Fair turns 74 this year! Through all that time, tens of thousands have made their own County Fair traditions. Many people have been participating in the event in one form or another through multiple generations. There are many ways in which to participate at the Coconino County Fair, and I will highlight them below.

For many, participating means exhibiting through one of our Junior Exhibit Departments. When we use the term 'junior', we mean any exhibitor who participates in the Fair as part of the local 4-H or FFA program. Most of our Junior Exhibitors typically come from a long line of families who have exhibited over Labor Day Weekend. When I speak to the families of Junior Exhibitors, I often hear about the generations that exhibited before and the hope that it continues after. These exhibitors often participate in the Coconino County Fair on an annual basis from ages 8 to 18, which means their families are typically participating in a big way during that time as well.

The Fair encourages participation from another class of exhibitors, those from the Community. We get entries from the Community in many different Departments, including Fine Arts, Home Economics, Open Livestock, Floriculture, Agriculture & Horticulture, and many others. We accept entries from people of all ages and abilities in our buildings. There is no cost to enter, except a nominal fee for Open Livestock; and participants are eligible to win ribbons, gift certificates, and/or cash prizes! Cash prizes are available thanks to our sponsor, the Friends of Coconino County Parks (<https://friendsofcocoparks.org>).

Another subset of people that participate annually in the Coconino County Fair are the people working the event. This is a large group of people that includes the full-time staff, temporary event staff, entertainers, sponsors, volunteers, vendors, partners, and contracted personnel. We see a lot of repeat visitors each year in this group as well. We try to keep entertainment and vendors fresh, but there are fan favorites in both of those areas, so some return on an annual or semi-annual basis. For example, the Flagstaff Dancin' Grannies and Flagstaff Community Band have been performing at the Coconino Fair for a very long time and are local favorites.

The last group of participants are the attendees. This group makes up the vast majority of people who interact with the Fair. They did not enter any exhibits, nor are they working or volunteering. They want to get into the Fairgrounds to do some variation of getting fair food and drinks, listening to music, walking through the buildings to see the exhibits and vendors, and riding on rides. Many attendees have also been coming to the Fair for many generations.

Each group mentioned above plays an important role in the Coconino County Fair. The displaying and judging of entries are pivotal parts of the County Fair experience. Without Junior or Community Exhibitors, our event wouldn't be a County Fair. The efforts from exhibitors also provide the Fair with demonstrations and displays that are enjoyed by all who attend the Fair. We obviously couldn't put on the Coconino County Fair without the hundreds of staff, volunteers, vendors, entertainers, sponsors, partners, and all the other people who work tirelessly before, during, and after Labor Day Weekend. The last group, attendees, help make many of our goals possible because this group generates the most revenue, which is what keeps the Fair operational and growing each year. No group is more important or impactful than the others, and each work together in order to provide an excellent County Fair experience.

We'll see you at the Fair!

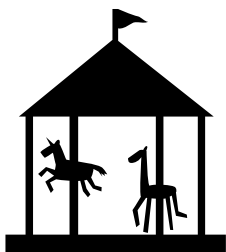

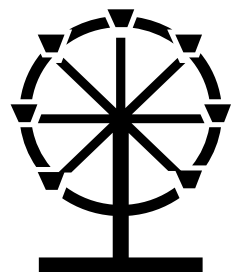

How to enter an exhibit into the Fair

Go to CoconinoCountyFair.com or use the forms in this book.

1. Find the department/s or category that represents your area of interest – Agriculture & Horticulture, Home Economics, Open Poultry, Fine Arts, etc.
2. Find the entry form for your area of interest:
 - Entry Form A – is for non-livestock, non-4-H entries such as Agriculture & Horticulture, Gems & Minerals, Home Economics, etc.
 - Entry Form B – is for anyone entering an animal in an Open animal category and not in 4-H.
 - Entry Form C – is for schools entering in the Schools Building.
 - Entry Form D – is for the livestock judging contest
 - Youth involved in 4-H projects must submit entries online through CoconinoCountyFair.com.
3. Complete the Entry Form.
 - Department Code – The two letter code for each Department. These are found on the first page of each Department's section in the Fair Book.
 - Division Code – Is a one or two letter code found on the first page of some Department's section in the Fair Book. The code will denote one's age group or level of expertise.
 - Class Number & Description – Are the multi-digit number and description for the specific item you want to enter. For example, the Class number and Description for a Card Collection in the Hobbies & Collectibles Department looks like this:

4. Fill out the form online, email, or mail your entry form as indicated on the entry form. A separate entry form is required for each department you entered into. Note: One entry per Class number unless otherwise stated in the department guidelines.
5. Photographs of submitted entries may be used for Coconino County Fair promotional purposes and may not credit the entrant.
6. Still have questions? You can contact the Superintendent whose contact information is on the first page of each Department's section in the Fair Book or call the Entries Hotline at (928) 679-8030 or email entries@coconino.az.gov.

Helpful Definitions

1. Class Number – A number assigned to individual entries or competitions.
2. Department Code – The two-letter code identifying each department for example, AH is Agriculture & Horticulture.
3. Division Code – A group of exhibits sharing similar characteristics such as age, skill level, division or breed.
4. Entry or Exhibit – An eligible animal or exhibit (object or collection of objects) which is entered to be judged.
5. Exhibitor – The individual or entity submitting an entry and responsible for animals and articles entered. If not the owner of the articles or animals entered, the exhibitor is acting as agent for such owner. In the case of a minor, the exhibitor is defined as participant and parent and/or legal guardian.
6. Judging – American System: The judging process to rank exhibits against one another and award one first placing, one second placing, etc. Danish System: The judging process to compare each exhibit on its own merit against the scorecard, where applicable, or recognized standard and award as many first placing, second placing, etc. as merited.
7. Junior - Junior departments are only open to exhibitors enrolled in a Coconino County 4-H/FFA program.
8. Large Livestock – Includes cattle, sheep, swine, goats, and camelids.
9. Small Livestock – Includes poultry, pigeons, rabbits, and cavyes.

Enter your exhibits online!

Save time and hassle by filling out entry forms and paperwork online, while making sure your entry is correct and complete. Visit CoconinoCountyFair.com and click on “**Entries and Exhibits**” for a link to an easy, online system to enter your exhibits. Coconino County Fair uses ShoWorks, the most popular exhibitor and entries management software used by many state and county fairs.

General Fair Rules

In addition to these General Fair Rules, all other rules listed in the Fair Book apply. Violation of any rule as listed may result in disqualification from the Fair, removal of exhibitor and/or exhibits from the fairgrounds, and/or forfeiture of awards. Please read all rules carefully.

1. All rules are subject to interpretation by Coconino County Parks and Recreation (CCPR). CCPR reserves the right to add or amend these rules as deemed necessary.
2. All departments are open to Coconino County residents ONLY unless stated otherwise in the individual department rules.
3. Commercial organizations, non-profit organizations, and any others exhibiting articles not-for-competition must make arrangements with the Fair Manager. The Fair Manager will, in all cases, be the final authority in matters pertaining to commercial and non-competitive exhibits.
4. CCPR will take every precaution to ensure proper care and protection of exhibits while at the Fair, yet will accept no responsibility for the loss or damage to any exhibit.
5. The only livestock and domestic animals permitted on fairgrounds during the Fair will be as follows:
 - service animals as defined by the ADA
 - registered Fair exhibit animals
 - animals contracted as Fair entertainment
 - animals used for exhibition/demonstration
 - animals approved through CCPR
6. Exhibitors' vehicles will not be allowed on the fairgrounds beginning Wednesday before the Fair through the end of the Fair, except with the approval of Fair management. Non-motorized carts are allowed.
7. All Junior exhibitors must complete forms online.
8. All entries must be completed by the deadline stated on each department's page and submitted online, mailed, or brought to CCPR, located at Exit 337 off I-17. Mail: 2446 Fort Tuthill Loop, Flagstaff, AZ 86005. No late entries will be accepted. Use entry forms located in the Fair Book (or duplicated copies) or online at www.CoconinoCountyFair.com. Call (928) 679-8030 or email entries@coconino.az.gov for entry related questions.
9. Ribbons and Awards: All departments list whether ribbon, trophy or special awards are available. However, there may be additional awards such as sponsored gift certificates.
10. Exhibitors are responsible for transportation of exhibits to and from the Fair, or to and from County Outreach pickup locations.
11. No exhibit may be entered in multiple classes unless individual department rules state otherwise.
12. CCPR has the authority to disqualify any entrant in case of violation of general or special rules or for misconduct while on the fairgrounds. The decision of the Fair Manager or CCPR Director will be final.
13. Superintendents and/or CCPR reserve the right to refuse entries which are substandard, offensive, or hazardous to the public. CCPR will make the final decision when necessary.
14. Photographs of submitted entries may be used for Coconino County Fair promotional purposes and may not credit the entrant.
15. Five or more entries per exhibitor in one department entitle the exhibitor to 1 one-day free admission to the Fair, to be picked up from the superintendent at receiving.
16. Entry Receiving Locations: Exhibitors must take entries directly to the appropriate Fair building as noted in Fair Book. Parking is available in the main lot north of fairgrounds entrance. For large and/or heavy department entries, vehicles may enter the fairgrounds via the alley west of the Livestock Show Ring or gate south of the Commercial Building. Please be cautious of workers, equipment and vehicles on the fairgrounds. Contact the department Superintendent if you have any questions regarding access to the building on entry day.
17. Coconino County is an equal opportunity provider of event activities and vendor spaces where sundry articles, items, products, documents, materials, parts, assemblies, and plants, animals, minerals and like kinds [altogether called "Product"] are possessed on site and/or presented to the public for display, use, exchange, and/or sale. By signing a license or receiving a permit or other permission from Coconino County to be present at and to use the Coconino County Fairgrounds for the display, exchange or sale of any Product, the Licensee, Exhibitor, and/or possessor of such Product warrants and assures Coconino County that the Product is lawfully possessed, is not counterfeit or contraband material, and the possession of such Product by the Licensee/Exhibitor is not violative of any federal, state or local law, statute or ordinance. Furthermore, the Licensee/ Exhibitor warrants and assures Coconino County that the Licensee/ Exhibitor shall not engage in the possession, display, sale or exchange of Product that Licensee/ Exhibitor knows or has reason to know is counterfeit, contraband, illegal or unlawful. Violation of this provision may expose the offender to prosecution by the appropriate local, state or federal authority. Licensees/ Exhibitors shall cooperate with law enforcement in the investigation and prosecution of offenders.
18. Entry fees must be paid prior to CCPR receiving entry(s).

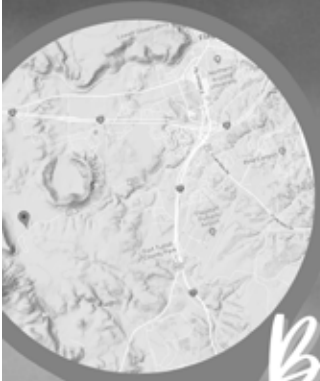

General Livestock Rules

In addition to the General Fair Rules, National Show Ring Code of Ethics, and individual department rules, the following regulations shall apply to all Junior Livestock and Open Livestock entries. Any violation of these rules may result in disqualification from the fair, removal of exhibitor and exhibits from the fairgrounds, and/or forfeiture of awards. Please read all rules carefully.

1. All rules are subject to interpretation by Coconino County Parks and Recreation [CCPR]. CCPR reserves the right to add to or amend these rules as deemed necessary. Willful violation of any Fair rules will result in disciplinary action, including refusal of entries or removal of entries from this and/or subsequent fairs.
2. All 4-H/FFA livestock departments are open to Coconino County members only. Junior livestock exhibitors must be currently enrolled, and a member in good standing, as determined by the 4-H agent or FFA Advisor.
3. Exhibitor must always have reasonable control over their animal while at the Fair. Any exhibitor who cannot maintain reasonable control over their animal will be required to remove the animal from the fairgrounds.
4. All exhibitors, parents, leaders, advisors, etc. are to conduct themselves in a proper manner. This includes proper behavior and proper dress as required by the 4-H/FFA program – no tennis shoes, open-toed shoes, t-shirts or ball caps while showing. 4-H/FFA members must conduct themselves in a showmanship manner appropriate to 4-H/FFA. Use of inappropriate language or conduct by exhibitors, parents, leaders, advisors, etc. is prohibited and is grounds for disqualification. Violation of this rule may result in expulsion from the barn, show ring, or fairgrounds.
5. If any exhibitor, or parent of an exhibitor, verbally or physically confronts a judge, that exhibitor will be disqualified, and the exhibitor (and/or parents) will be required to immediately remove themselves and the exhibit(s) involved from the fairgrounds. Awards will be forfeited. Any exhibitor, parent, leader, or fairgoer who verbally or physically confronts a judge will be required to immediately remove themselves from the fairgrounds.

6. All animals must be healthy, sound, free of drugs, and free of external parasites. No unhealthy animals will be allowed to remain on the fairgrounds and cannot be sold. If a question arises as to the health of the animal, a veterinarian will be summoned at the expense of the owner or exhibitor. Deformed and/or injured animals will not be accepted and may not be shown.
7. 4-H/FFA livestock exhibitors will be issued a wristband for four (4) days admission into the Fair and parking. In addition, they will receive two (2) 4-day admission and parking passes for two (2) parents and/or guardians to accompany the exhibitor. If a parent of an exhibitor is a 4-H Livestock Leader, then no additional passes will be issued.
8. 4-H/FFA livestock exhibitors may have two market animals of the same species in a project. Both animals must be properly identified and registered as project animals with the Northern Arizona Junior Livestock Auction Association [NAJLA] at the start of the feeding program. Only one market animal per species can be officially weighed-in at the Fair. This animal must be used by the exhibitor for all market and showmanship classes of that species. Animals sifted for weight cannot be replaced. An exception of this rule is made for Chicken Fryer Pen and Pen of Three Market Rabbits where 3 animals are weighed. and exhibitor may use another animal entered by them for showmanship.
9. NAJLA will notify all 4-H/FFA market livestock project members about animal ear tagging and/or identification. All market animals must be ear-tagged or tattooed, in the possession of and under the daily care of the 4-H/FFA member by these deadlines.
Market animal ownership deadlines and weights:

Animal	Deadline	Weight
Steer	May 1	900 lbs Min
Swine	June 15	225 lbs to 325 lbs
Sheep	June 15	90 lbs Min
Goats	June 15	60 lbs Min
Poultry	July 1	3.5 lbs to 6 lbs

Rabbit	July 1	3.5 lbs to 5.5 lbs
10. Ownership requirement of non-market livestock is 60 days prior to opening day of the Fair. Animals must be in the exhibitor's possession and under their daily care from that date forward.
11. Entering a market animal does not guarantee that the animal will be eligible to exhibit at the Fair; exhibiting at the Fair does not guarantee that the animal will be sold; selling an animal in the auction does not guarantee that a profit will be made.
12. Animals not sold through the auction may sell out of the barns after the auction concludes. No animal may be advertised for sale prior to the conclusion of the auction. This includes 4-H/FFA and open livestock animals. Consult with department Superintendent for assistance in advertising. Exhibitors may not verbally solicit the sale of animals within barns. Exhibitors are responsible for the care, safety, and control of animals that have been sold until such animals have left the fairgrounds.

13. Livestock **MUST** be vet checked onsite by the Fair Veterinarian and checked in with the appropriate Superintendents prior to being placed in barns. The Livestock Coordinator (or designee) must be supplied all required ADAG ownership/seasonal pass papers before check-in.
 14. The Weigh-In Committee will officially weigh all market livestock entries. Animals are to be clean and dry. Large stock market animals will be weighed between 9 am - 4 pm Steers will be weighed between 3 pm - 4 pm unless previous arrangements have been made. Exhibitors must be in line for weigh-in no later than 4 pm. Exhibitors must check-in their own animals to weigh-in. Failure to weigh-in your own animal will result in the exhibitor being disqualified and the animal being removed from the Fairgrounds. Small stock market project members will be advised of small stock weigh-in procedures when their animals are checked in.
 15. Once an animal is checked in, no replacement animal will be allowed for any reason.
 16. The livestock Weigh-In Committee may consist of the Jr. Livestock Coordinator and/or their designee, the AZ Department of Agriculture, the Weigh Master, a vet, and one member of Northern Arizona Junior Livestock Auction Association. Only one parent may assist the exhibitor with getting their animal onto the scale.
 17. Market livestock will be weighed one time only. Protest or request for reweigh must be made while the animal is on the scale. The Weigh Master will balance the scale and immediately reweigh the animal. The Weigh Master will have final say.
 18. Animals that do not make weight may be shown in showmanship and feeder classes only and will not be sold through the auction. Members who do not want to show their sifted animal must remove it from the fairgrounds by 5 p.m. on weigh-in day. Animals sifted for reasons other than weight must be removed immediately from the fairgrounds.
 19. By entering your animal into the Fair, you are consenting to allow the animal to be used for Round Robin and/or the Livestock Judging Contest.
 20. To participate in the Coconino County Fair, all 4-H/FFA Market Livestock Exhibitors must have a current YQCA certification. The expiration date must not expire prior to the last day of the fair.
 21. Youth Exhibitors are responsible for the daily care and showing of their animals while at the Fair, this includes but is not limited to washing, feeding, watering, fitting, and daily cleaning of pens/bedding areas. Assistance may be provided by 4-H/FFA members currently enrolled in the Coconino County 4-H or FFA program. **Adults are not allowed to physically assist exhibitors in the daily care or preparation of the animal while at the Fair.**
 22. Large livestock exhibitors must complete morning feeding and primary clean-up of pen area before 9 a.m. each day. Barns will be open to exhibitors by 7:30 a.m. each day of the fair. After 9 a.m. there will be no unattended pans in the pens, except for water containers in the goat and sheep barns and automatic waterers in the swine barn. Evening feeding must take place before 7:30 p.m.
- All tack and feed containers should be clearly labeled with the exhibitor's name. It is also recommended that exhibitor's name be put in some obscure place on show clothes. Tools must be put away immediately after use. All tools should be clearly marked, in permanent ink, with exhibitor's name and 4-H/FFA club if applicable.
23. All exhibitors are required to completely clean out their pens, stripped to the ground, at the conclusion of the Fair.
 24. Grooming of animals will only be allowed in designated areas. Please check with the Superintendent for your department's area.
 25. Cleaning supplies and bedding will not be provided to each exhibitor. Exhibitors are expected to provide their own cleaning equipment and bedding. Poultry and Rabbit exhibitors must check with department superintendents for feeding and cleaning directions.
 26. Exhibitors **MUST** show the animals they registered for the Fair. Exceptions shall be made for people with disabilities as determined by 4-H Youth Development Agent, FFA Advisor, the Livestock Coordinator, and the Fair Manager.
 27. **MANDATORY SHOWMANSHIP:** To be eligible to sell in the auction, exhibitor **MUST** participate in Showmanship. This animal must be the animal use by the exhibitor in the market class. Chicken Fryer Pen, Turkey, and Market Rabbits are excluded, these exhibitors may use another animal entered by them for showmanship.
 28. **FOR ALL SPECIES:** Drenching - No item or device shall be inserted into an animal's mouth with the intent to force the animal to ingest liquid/food/substance except as necessary for medical care under the direction of the Fair veterinarian and staff authorization. Animals may be assisted in hydrating (using water or species approved/ labeled electrolytes) with bottles, sprayers, non-intrusive device labeled for that species- as long as nothing is inserted more than two inches inside the animal's mouth and no airways are blocked (can't cover their nose to make them swallow).
 29. No chemicals (except those approved in writing by the Fair management) shall be used within livestock pens or barn areas.
 30. Exhibitors who live more than 50 miles away from Flagstaff area (i.e. Page, Tuba City, etc.) may start loading and remove exhibits from the Fairgrounds at 2:30 p.m. on Monday. This is for all species of Livestock (large and small), and 4-H Club Work. All exhibits **MUST** be returning to the exhibitor's residence. No vehicles will be allowed on the Fairgrounds before 4 p.m. If Large Livestock is removed, exhibitor must meet barn clean-up rules before departure. Animals sold in the auction cannot be removed from the Fairgrounds prior to 4 p.m. on Monday.
 31. Exhibitors and their families must follow all rules and policies set forth in the International Fire Code per the State Fire Marshal. Common infractions include gasoline storage, location of generator, and location of pop-up tents.

Any violation of General Livestock rules may result in disqualification from this Fair or future Fairs.

Barn Duty For 4-H/FFA Members

Barn duty is a requirement of every 4-H/FFA member with an entry. Sign-up sheets will be posted prior to Fair opening and is the exhibitor's responsibility to sign-up for barn duty as required by Department Superintendent. Failure to sign-up or not show up for barn duty will result in disciplinary actions.

Barn duty consists of:

1. Being in the barn or outside pens while on duty.
2. Greet the public coming into the building.
3. Monitor animals on exhibit for safety and general condition.
4. Interact with the public by answering questions or explaining things about the animals.
5. Pick up trash and dispose of it.
6. Help maintain cleanliness and neatness of area.

Junior Livestock Exhibitor Grievance Procedures

In order for the Coconino County Fair to function efficiently, a grievance procedure and committee has been developed to rule on all grievances, protests or appeals related to Junior livestock departments. The Grievance Committee shall consist of the Fair Manager or Designee, Cooperative Extension Representative, the Livestock Coordinator, a 4-H or FFA leader, and a Fair Superintendent. Any members of this committee with a conflict of interest shall recuse themselves.

The Grievance Committee shall be assembled in such a way that no participant will have a conflict of interest in serving on the committee. Decisions of this committee will be by consensus and will be final.

A grievance or protest can only be filed by an exhibitor. The Grievance Committee will consider no protest or appeal based upon the statement that the judge or judges are incompetent or have overlooked an animal. The right of an exhibitor to appeal the decision of the judge to the Grievance Committee will lie only when it is charged that the award has been made in violation of the rules governing the exhibit, or when it is charged the decision of the judge has been influenced or interfered with by another. All questions in dispute, or differences not covered by General Fair Rules, The National Show Ring Code of Ethics for the Coconino County Fair General Livestock Rules, or the Junior Livestock Rules shall be referred to the Grievance Committee whose decision shall be final.

All protests must be made to the Grievance Committee within one hour of the occurrence in question. The Grievance Committee will attempt to make a decision regarding the grievance within two hours after having received the written grievance.

The procedure to file a grievance is as follows:

1. Exhibitor shall notify the department Superintendent where the problem exists to allow discussion and possible resolution prior to filing a written grievance.
2. If the situation cannot be resolved, exhibitor must compose a statement regarding the grievance. A complete Grievance Statement shall contain:
 - a. Date
 - b. Time
 - c. Problem
 - d. Signatures the exhibitor, their parent/guardian, the Department Superintendent, and the Livestock Coordinator
 - e. Phone numbers and/or e-mail addresses of said parties
 - f. Desire or not to present grievance to the Grievance committee
3. The Grievance Statement must be given to the 4-H or FFA Youth Development Staff.
4. The Grievance Committee will meet with the Superintendent for further discussion and clarification.
5. The Grievance Committee will be assembled and will then meet privately to discuss the grievance and make a final decision. The final decision will be based on committee consensus.
6. Persons submitting and/or persons upon whom a grievance has been submitted may present their case to the Grievance Committee. Presenters will be given 10 minutes each. The desire to present to the Grievance Committee shall be so noted in the Grievance Statement. Presenters must make themselves available to present to the committee when the committee meets and will be notified as to when said meeting will take place.
7. Exhibitors will receive a written statement back from the Grievance Committee and will be told of the Committee's decision verbally by the 4-H or FFA Youth Development Staff.



Round Robin Showmanship Procedures

Junior and Senior 4-H/FFA members who win a Showmanship class are eligible to compete in Round Robin and Supreme Round Robin Showmanship. Any Junior or Senior 4-H/FFA member who wins more than one Showmanship class must decide which species they wish to show in and notify the Livestock Coordinator immediately after the last showmanship class the exhibitor is participating in.

The Reserve Showman of the species not chosen by the Grand Champion Showman will then be eligible to compete in Round Robin. Two animals from each species will be at each station. There will be a small stock as well as a large stock Round Robin competition. Showmen may compete in either or both competitions.

All showmen who wish to compete for Supreme Round Robin Showmanship must show all species present in small stock and large stock Round Robin. Small stock can include Rabbit, Cavy, and Poultry. Large Stock can include Camelid, Market Swine, Market/Breeding Sheep, Market/Breeding Goat, Dairy/Non-Dairy Goat, Market Beef, Jr. Breeding Cattle, English Horse Showmanship, and Western Horse Showmanship. To qualify for Round Robin, each class must have at least two Showmanship entries per division (Jr. Sr.). Novice Showmanship is NOT included in Round Robin Showmanship.

Junior and Senior large and small stock Round Robin showmanship winners will be determined using a point system. The Junior and Senior Supreme Showman will be selected using a combined score of large stock, small stock species and written knowledge challenge.

1. Showmen must show the same animal that was used in the showmanship class in which they won Champion Showman or Reserve Champion Showman.
2. Each species will have appointed stations in the show ring. For example; the Junior Showman will have his/her animal at a station and the Senior Showman will have the same species at that station. (Each station may have two animals of the same species.)
3. Showmen will have about five minutes at each station and will rotate around the show ring until they have shown each species.
4. Each station will have two judges, a Junior Judge and a Senior Judge. Each judge will use a scorecard to judge each Showman.
5. There will be a Junior Round Robin Champion and a Senior Round Robin Champion. A Junior and Senior Supreme Round Robin Showman will be selected from the 4-H/FFA Showman who has the most points between small and large stock for their respective age division.

Showmen are not required to show both large and small stock. However, those who choose to compete for Supreme Round Robin Showman will need to compete in both large and small stock.

6. Blank scorecards will be available for review in each livestock barn.

Junior Herdsmen Award Procedures

Each Junior Livestock department offers one Junior Herdsman Award based on the following criteria:

1. Neatness, attractiveness and cleanliness of exhibitor's pens and surrounding area.
2. Condition and appearance of exhibitor's animals throughout the Fair, and the level of care and attention given to his/her animals.
3. Interaction with fairgoers, educational exhibit or presentation in the barn.
4. Friendliness and cooperation with staff and fellow exhibitors.

Show Ring Code of Ethics

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

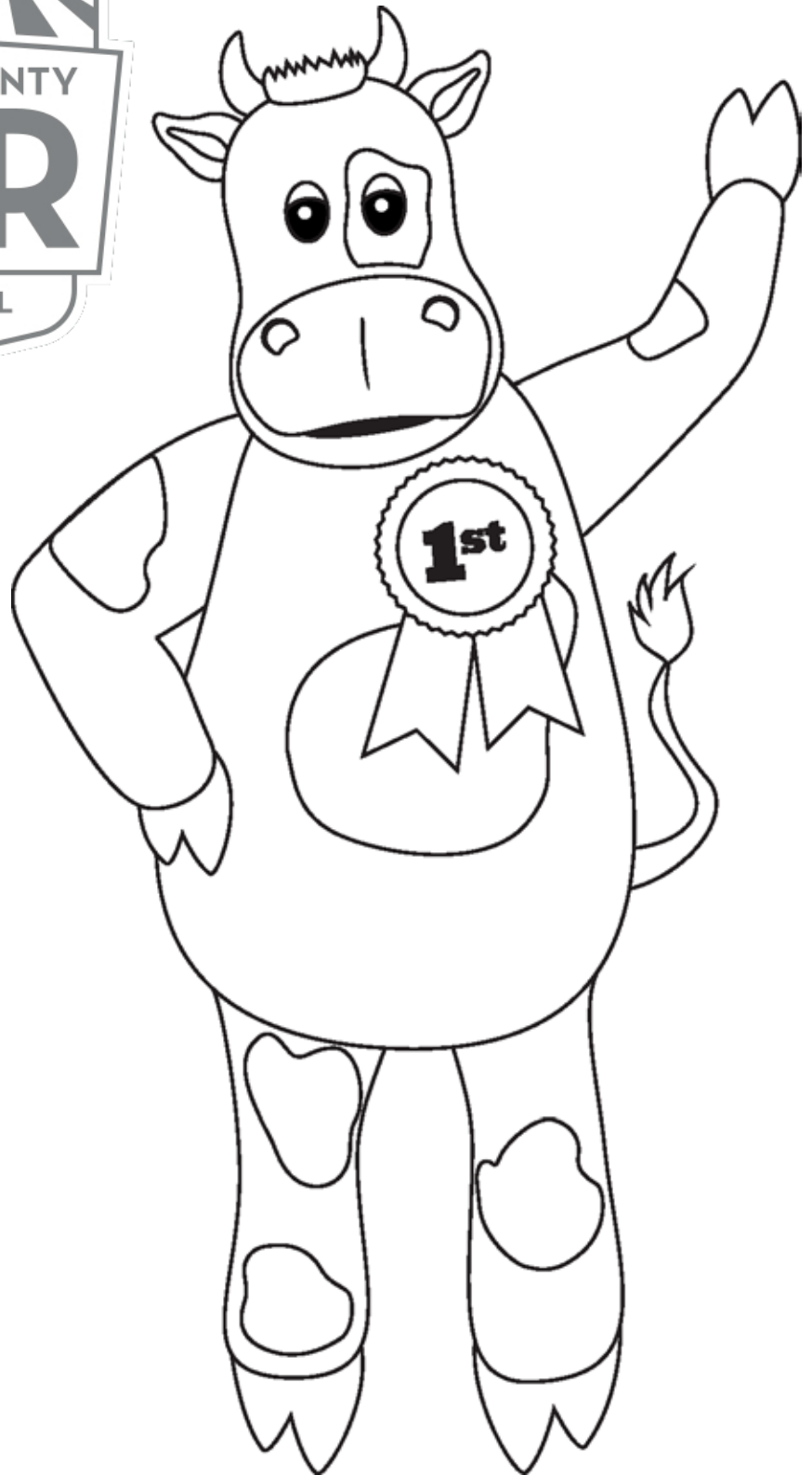
1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of volatile drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory, to which it is sent, is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expos and any special notices to members.
11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Other cooperating shows will be notified of the action taken by Show Management, which may affect the eligibility of the individual, group or sponsoring organization for participation at other shows. Coconino County Parks and Recreation will have the final decision.

AUCTION RULES

These rules give an overview of the auction and exhibitor requirements. An exhibitor's entry into the livestock auction represents an explicit agreement by the exhibitor and the exhibitor's parent, or guardian, with all of the following rules and penalties. All animals intended for human consumption offered for sale in the auction must 1) meet residue tolerances established by USDA/FDA and 2) be free of any substance not approved of by the USDA/FDA (www.usda.gov). NAJLA is not part of 4-H, FFA or the Coconino County Fair. These rules and their enforcement are totally separate from 4-H/FFA.

I. GENERAL RULES

The Junior Livestock Auction (Auction) is under the supervision of the Northern Arizona Junior Livestock Association, hereafter referred to as NAJLA. The Auction is limited to Market Steers, Market Lambs, Market Swine, Market Goats, Rabbit Meat Pens, Chicken Fryer Pens, and Market Turkeys. NAJLA has the sole authority in the interpretation and enforcement of the Auction rules.

A. NOTIFICATION:

1. NAJLA reserves the right to test any animal officially entered in any division eligible to sell in the Auction, for any substances including drugs/medications or feed additives.
2. For the Coconino County Fair, at a minimum, the Grand and Reserve Champion market livestock (steers, lambs, swine, and goats) will be tested. Tissue, blood and urine samples **may** be collected. Blood and urine samples will be collected as soon as possible after the Grand and Reserve Champions are selected and/or as required. Other animals entered in the market shows **may** be tested. Sale money will be withheld until tests are completed.
3. WITHDRAWAL OF LIVESTOCK FROM AUCTION:
Exhibitors who want to withdraw their market animal from the Auction must complete a Withdrawal Slip available from a Barn Superintendent. Return form to a NAJLA board member by 6:00 pm on the evening **prior** to the auction. If you do not fill out this form and return it by the deadline, you will be required to sell your animal in the auction. If you fail to bring your animal into the auction, or if you remove your animal from the sale ring before the sale is complete, you will be prohibited from selling at future NAJLA coordinated events including the Auctions.
4. Only the exhibitor & the exhibitor's animal are allowed in the Sale Ring during the auction. **Exception:** an exhibitor is allowed to have help from current 4-H/FFA members to carry rabbit meat pens, and chicken fryer pens.
5. Animals are not the responsibility of NAJLA, Coconino County, the Coconino County Fair or Cooperative Extension. Each exhibitor is responsible for the care and feeding of all project animals until they are released by the Superintendent on the last day of the Coconino County Fair at 4:00 pm.
6. NAJLA reserves the right to make deductions from any exhibitor's sale to cover outstanding balances that have been generated by other family or household members associated with the exhibitor.

7. PER COCONINO COUNTY FAIR LIVESTOCK RULES, MARKET ANIMALS MUST BE OWNED AND IN THE EXHIBITOR'S POSSESSION BY:

STEERS - May 1
SWINE, LAMBS, & GOATS - June 15
TURKEYS, RABBITS & POULTRY PENS - July 1

NAJLA ONLINE REGISTRATION and W9's MUST BE COMPLETED on or before:

STEERS- May 9
SWINE, LAMBS, & GOATS- June 22
TURKEYS, RABBITS & POULTRY PENS- July 9

EXHIBITOR ENTRY AND SIGNATURE RELEASE FORM, W9, as well as photos must be uploaded with online entry to complete your registration.

8. LATE REGISTRATION NOTICE: ONLINE Market Registrations received after the deadline; but no later than one week, will be charged a late fee of \$100.00 PER Large Stock Exhibit, and \$50.00 PER Small Stock Exhibit.

9. BACK-UP ANIMALS: Immediate family members may register the same Back-Up animal, not to exceed 2 registered animals per exhibitor, per species.

B. NUMBER OF ANIMALS TO BE SOLD:

1. Exhibitors will be allowed to sell two different lots, or animals, in the Auction.
2. All Grand and Reserve Champion steers, lambs, swine, goats, turkeys, rabbit meat pens and chicken fryer pens **must** sell.
3. In the event that you have 2 or more Champions, you may sell one additional animal.

4. EXHIBITOR DRESS CODE:

Exhibitor Dress Code for entry in the sale ring shall be as follows:

For 4-H Exhibitors:

Pants or jeans: that are dark blue or black in good condition.

Shirt: A white long or short sleeved shirt, with a collar. 4-H green tie, scarf, 4-H vest, 4-H Club jackets in 4-H colors are permitted, but not required.

For FFA Exhibitors:

Bottoms: black skirt, black slacks, or black jeans in good condition. Only black nylon hosiery will be permitted.

Tops: white collared blouse and official FFA blue scarf or blue or black tie. Official FFA jacket must be worn and zipped to the top.

Shoes: Black dress shoes with closed heel and toe.

No other jackets, vests, sweatshirts or sweaters are to be worn. No baseball hats, caps*, tiaras, crowns, sunglasses, sandals, tennis shoes or open toed shoes are to be worn. Exceptions for religious reasons will be considered. Animals and/or exhibitors may not be decorated; bows, glitter, graffiti, costumes, etc. except for ribbons, buckles, received during the fair. Failure to comply with the standard of presentation may result in not being able to enter the sale ring to sell your animal.

***Cowboy hats will be allowed.**

D. EXHIBITOR RESPONSIBILITIES DURING AUCTION:

- Exhibitors must take their own animal through the auction ring except in unusual circumstances, such as sickness, family emergency. Extra-curricular activities will not be considered an exception. Only currently enrolled Coconino County 4-H and Coconino County FFA members exhibiting at the current Coconino County Fair may serve as a substitute, with the approval of the NAJLA Executive Board.
- Exhibitors who fail to be at the auction ring in the proper sequence will not be allowed to sell their animals through the auction and must remove their animals from the fairgrounds on the final day of the Coconino County Fair after 4:00 pm; or personally consign them to a packer through NAJLA. Commission will be charged for all animals consigned.
- Exhibitors are required to send their buyer a thank you letter by October 31, of the current year; this is in addition to any optional gift given to your buyer at the Auction.
- Exhibitors who fail to properly feed and water their animal(s) and maintain their pen after the auction will be fined and will forfeit all monies received and will not be able to sell at future NAJLA coordinated events including the Auctions. Buyer will still receive their purchased animal and monies will go to the auction committee fund.

II. LIVESTOCK RULES

A. All General Fair Rules, General Livestock Rules, Junior Livestock Rules and NAJLA Auction Rules apply.

B. WEIGH-IN & CHECK-IN:

- Only one registered Market animal per species can be officially weighed-in. Animals sifted for weight cannot be replaced with another registered Market animal.
- WEIGH IN:**

a. LARGE STOCK

All large stock market animals will be weighed by the Weigh-In Committee on the Thursday before the first day of the Coconino County Fair between 9:00 am and 4:00 pm. Scales will close at 4:00 pm.

- STEERS, LAMBS, SWINE, AND GOATS** must provide an Arizona Seasonal Pass.

Classification is to be determined by the exhibitor when submitting your Ear Tag Registration Form. Correctly identifying and declaring your animal's breed is your responsibility. Consult with your project leader for correct classification. Breed will be confirmed by an Official Classifier.

b. SMALL STOCK

Small Stock animals will be checked-in and weighed on the Wednesday, before the first day of the Coconino County Fair between 3:00 pm and 7:00 pm or the Thursday, before the first day of the Coconino County Fair between 9:00 am and 12:00 pm.

c. Animals must be clean and dry at time of weigh-in. Exhibitors must take their own animal to weigh-in. Failure to weigh-in your own animal will result in the animal and exhibitor being disqualified and the animal must be removed from the Fairgrounds.

d. Market Livestock will be weighed one time only. Protest or request for reweigh must be made while the animal is on the scale. The Weighmaster will balance the scale and immediately reweigh the animal and take that weight as the final weight. The Weighmaster will have final say on the weight.

e. Animals that do not make weight may be shown in Showmanship and Feeder Classes only, and will not be sold through the Auction.

f. SMALL STOCK Market Exhibitors will be advised of Small Stock weigh-in procedures when they check-in with their respective Barn Superintendent.

C. SALE PROCEDURE/RIBBON:

Market steers, lambs, swine, goats, turkeys, rabbit meat pens and chicken fryer pens will be sold at the Auction on the Saturday of the fair. BLUE, RED AND WHITE Ribbon awarded animals will be sold. **Animals deemed not "Market Ready" by the judge, will not sell at the Auction.**

- Exhibitors will be paid for the maximum sale weight of:

Swine:	300 pounds
Lambs:	150 pounds
Steers:	1350 pounds
Goats:	150 pounds

- Auctioneer(s) will be provided by NAJLA.
- Sale order will be determined by NAJLA.
- Checks will be sent by the NAJLA Treasurer to the exhibitor when adequate funds are available (at least 8 weeks after the conclusion of the auction). Adequate funds are defined as enough money collected to cover all exhibitors' checks, and other liabilities incurred by NAJLA in administering the Auction.
- PERCENTAGES & FEES:** There will be an Administrative Fee not to exceed; 4% on beef and 6% on swine, lamb, goats and small stock on all animals that sell through the Auction. Funds received from fees shall be used by NAJLA. In addition, a fee will be deducted from each exhibitor's check for any national steer/lamb/swine Check-Off program and livestock inspections (as required).

An Exhibitor Fee not to exceed \$20 for steer, swine, lamb, and goat and, \$10 for small stock, will be deducted from each exhibitor's check. In the event that a sale check needs to be re-issued because it was lost or outdated, the exhibitor will be charged the stop payment fee for the original check.

D. EXHIBITOR'S RESPONSIBILITIES: FOREIGN SUBSTANCE

- It is the exhibitor's responsibility to submit a market animal intended for human consumption with 1) residue tolerances within guidelines established by USDA/FDA and 2) be free of any substance not approved of by the USDA/FDA. Exhibitors and their families should exercise special care when administering any products to or on their animals. **DO NOT USE** over the counter products made for human consumption or use. Use only products labeled as acceptable for species-specific market animal use. Other products may produce a residue in the meat and render the carcass unacceptable by the USDA/FDA. NAJLA reserves the right to require the exhibitor to submit the appropriate documentation proving that the animal is residue free or pay for the required testing.
- The exhibitor and/or immediate family must notify the Weighmaster of ANY substance which was administered to the animal prior to arrival at the Coconino County Fair and which has not met the required withdrawal period for that substance. These include, but are not limited to: growth stimulants, drugs/medication, and/or feed/water additives (i.e. antibiotics, wormers). Notification must be made in writing prior to check-in/weigh-in/penning of animal at the Coconino County Fair. The Superintendent will notify the President of NAJLA of the declaration.

3. If it is necessary to administer any USDA/FDA approved species-specific market animal drug/medication, during the time market livestock projects are housed at the Coconino County Fair, NAJLA must be notified in writing prior to any administrations. If situations warrant, such as medical emergency, that a NAJLA Executive Board member cannot be notified prior to administration of drug/medication, or feed/water additive, the exhibitor and/or his/her immediate family must notify the NAJLA within ten (10) hours of administration of drug/medication, or feed/water additive except in cases immediately prior to the auction, when notification *must take place prior to the animal entering the sale ring*. Exhibitor will notify the Executive Board of NAJLA of the declaration.
4. If any animal is being treated with USDA/FDA approved species specific market animal drug/medication and a delayed market date is needed to ensure a residue free carcass, it is the exhibitor's responsibility to ensure that appropriate announcement of the *delayed market requirement* is submitted in writing with the prescribed requirement to NAJLA prior to entering the sale ring. The exhibitor will then be responsible for maintaining the animal until it is residue free and then delivering the animal to the designated location (packer, buyer etc.) Grand and Reserve Grand Champion animals requiring a delayed slaughter date will be treated on an individual basis with special handling as required.
5. Sale money will be withheld until tests are complete.
6. *Exhibit Sale Disposition:* If it is proven that an animal has received or tests report the positive presence of drugs/medication, or feed/water additive(s) not approved by the USDA, FDA, or above the USDA guideline residue levels and/or not in compliance with the USDA Wholesome Meat Act, in any test or procedure, that animal will be disqualified and the exhibitor declared ineligible to receive sale proceeds or packer monies (if applicable). The carcass of a disqualified animal will be disposed of per instructions from USDA or FDA or the State of Arizona. The Buyer will be given the option to void the purchase or accept a replacement carcass of equal value. However, in either event the exhibitor **will not** receive any of the proceeds. If any entry is disqualified because of USDA Wholesome Meat act, all disqualifications can be applied.
7. If substances or residues, including drugs/medications, or feed/water additives, as defined above, are found in the tissue of the carcasses of animals entered/sold through the NAJLA sale, NAJLA will in no way be held liable or responsible for condition of carcass or sale price of animal. Further, the exhibitor and his/her family will indemnify and hold harmless NAJLA and all of its sponsors and assisting organizations, their employees and agents, against all legal or other proceedings in connection with said drug testing. The exhibitor and his/her family will indemnify and hold harmless the show and its sponsors and assisting organizations against all claims for injury to any person or property caused by any animal and/or its meat.

8. If the exhibitor's animal is condemned for anything other than illegal drug use, the Buyer has the option to refuse the product and void the purchase or accept a replacement carcass of equal value at the exhibitor's expense. If buyer voids the sale and refuses a replacement carcass, the exhibitor receives no compensation and may be liable for costs incurred.

E. EXHIBITOR'S PENALTIES:

If animals intended for human consumption are found with 1) residue tolerances **not** within guidelines established by USDA/FDA, 2) substances not approved of by the USDA/FDA and/or 3) if the substance is approved and the exhibitor fails to meet the requirements of withdrawal times and/or 4) fails to declare any medication and/or feed/water additives that have not met USDA/FDA withdrawal times at check in:

1. Exhibitor will be barred from consigning any/all animals at any NAJLA coordinated events including Auctions.
2. Exhibitor will forfeit all auction sale money associated with the contaminated animal and be subject to all disposal charges.
3. Anyone caught tampering per the above substance abuse violation with their own or another animal will be prohibited from the sale.
4. A written request for an appeal of the ban from the sale can be submitted to NAJLA.

III. EXHIBITOR INCIDENT AND GRIEVANCE

The NAJLA Grievance Committee will only accept grievances that relate to procedures, rules and incident's that are under the management of the Northern Arizona Jr. Livestock Association. Grievances relating to livestock shows and individual livestock barn issues should be directed to the Coconino County Fair Superintendent for the specific barn. The NAJLA Grievance committee is a five-member committee whose members have no family relationship to a current 4-H Market Livestock Exhibitor.

A grievance must be written on a NAJLA Exhibitor Incident and Grievance Form, available from a NAJLA committee member or Barn Superintendent, and given to the NAJLA Grievance Committee Chairperson within three hours of a protested occurrence. A grievance may only be filed by a market livestock exhibitor. Grievances will be adjudicated by the NAJLA Grievance Committee whose decision is final, and their decision will be made known to all parties involved within three hours of receipt of the Exhibitor Grievance Form. The NAJLA Grievance Committee will read the grievance as presented by the exhibitor. NAJLA reserves the right to discuss the grievance with anyone they deem necessary in resolving the grievance, including, but not limited to all parties named in the grievance. Upon request you may receive a copy of the form, and a copy of the written decision.

 - b. Do not put your name on the back of each work. Do not put your name on the front of the work. Fine Arts staff will put a piece of tape over the name.
 - c. Entries will receive careful handling and supervision throughout the Fair, however, insurance on your exhibit, if desired, must be carried by the artist. Coconino County Parks and Recreation will not be responsible for lost, stolen, or damaged items.
 - d. As long as space allows, all entries will be displayed. Entries found offensive in any way will not be exhibited. The Fair is a family event. The Department

Superintendents will make the decision.

6. Community Purchases: Mark the sale price clearly on the entry tag. An interested buyer will be asked to leave their name and phone number with the building host so that the seller may contact them. There is no fee for sale of work, but items may not be removed before the release time.
7. Awards: See the general rules in the front of this book for information on receiving awards, In addition, various merchants and groups may donate awards.
8. Release of Exhibits: Artists whose work is not accepted will be notified to pick up their work prior to the opening of the Fair. Exhibits will be released between 4 p.m. and 6 p.m. on the last day of the Fair. Please remember to bring your claim tickets. Any items not picked up within 5 business days of the last day of the Fair will be donated to a local charity.
9. Judging: Work will be judged in the American System and will be evaluated based on originality, interest, composition, technique, and presentation. If there are only a few items in a class, those items may be combined with similar classes for judging purposes. Results submitted by Judge(s) are considered final.

15% Did the photographer use the best light for the subject?

15% Is it good technically? Sharpness, exposure, color)

15% Is there good use of design and composition?

20% Is there a sense of telling a story or conveying an emotion?

Department Rules

1. All General Fair Rules apply.
2. All floriculture exhibits must be grown by the exhibitor and must be free of disease and insect infestation. Potted plants must have been grown by the exhibitor for at least six (6) months before entry and not have been a Blue Ribbon winner for the previous two years. The name and address of the owner must be placed on the underside of the container (if possible).
3. The Youth Age Group category is open to Coconino County residents under the age of 18 as of July 31, 2023. Rules and Classes are the same as for adults.
4. Containers will be available for cut specimens, except extra large dahlias and mammoth sunflowers.
5. Any entry not conforming to this schedule may be placed for exhibit but will not be judged. The show committee will not correct entries. If you are unsure of what Class an entry belongs in, please contact the Floriculture Superintendent.
6. All cut garden flower entries become the property of the Fair and will not be returned to the exhibitor.
7. Wild (native) growth that is on the State Conservation List must be accompanied by a permit or a written statement that it was grown on private property.
8. All fresh material must have an ample water supply available to insure good condition throughout the display period. The Floriculture Superintendent reserves the right to remove any exhibit once its appearance becomes unsuitable.
9. The number of entries to be made by one person for competition shall not be limited, however, each exhibitor may have only one entry per Class. Only residents from Coconino County will be eligible for competition.
10. Exhibitors showing five entries will receive one 1-day Fair admission.
11. Judging results submitted by judges and Department Superintendent are considered final.
12. Ribbons will be awarded according to merit. All items are judged against items in the same Class.
13. Entries will be released 4-5 pm the last day of the Fair.

How to Choose and Condition Specimens

1. Material for exhibition should be cut in the very early morning or late evening. Most plant material should be placed in warm deep water in a dark or shaded place away from all drafts, and left for several hours or overnight.
2. A mixture of lemon lime soda (not diet soda) and water (equal parts) will keep cut flowers fresh longer. Let this set ½ hour before adding flowers. Cut flower on a slant with a sharp blade, leaving enough stem to be re-cut again at the time of entry. Where possible, remove foliage from at least half of the length of the stem. At the time of entry, re-cut on a slant at least ½" above the end of stem.
3. If the blossoms must be transported some distance, they should be packed carefully in boxes and the flowers separated and protected with waxed paper. Very delicate blossoms should be carried in an upright position in tall cans or buckets half-filled with cool water. Crushed paper, sphagnum moss, sand or plastic snow may be used around the stems to hold them in place.
4. When selecting horticultural specimens, choose blossoms at the "peak of perfection". They should be uniform in size with stems straight, sturdy, and approximately the same length. Dust or spray residue should be carefully washed away.
5. Roses for exhibition should be cut when buds are one-third to one-half open. Roses, dahlias, poppies and any other flower that "bleeds" should be placed in fairly hot water after cutting.
6. Many specimens may be kept for several days at the "peak of perfection" by wrapping them in waxed paper or plastic, and keeping them in the refrigerator, with stems in water.

- Identification: Cabinet, museum, and miniature specimens must show on the label the name of the mineral and location.
- Cabochons, slabs, carvings, jewelry, etc., do not require complete labeling – it is necessary to identify the names of minerals used. Location may be given but is not required.
- No exhibit may be entered for more than one award; and **only one entry may be entered in any one class.**
- We encourage exhibitors to rearrange any previous display to give the show a new look or variety.
- Judging for all classes will be based on quality of specimens, variety of specimens, arrangement of exhibit, and labeling. All exhibits will be judged and awards made by class, by department class code.
- Professional and Commercial exhibits will be judged separately from Amateur exhibits. Decisions of the judges are final.
- Judging results submitted by judges and department superintendents are considered final.
- Exhibitors submitting five or more entries will receive one 1-day admission to the Fair.
- Ribbons will be awarded according to merit. All items are judged against items in the same class. Each class will be awarded one blue, one red, and one white ribbon.

6. All work on an exhibit must be done by the exhibitor in each class. An exception to this is the frame.
7. Superintendent may turn away entries that have not complied with rules.
8. Suggestions for displaying exhibits: Mount the exhibit in an attractive permanent manner and include labels or small cards that explain interesting details or unique characteristics of the exhibit. Be sure the exhibit is free from dust, mildew and odor. Make certain all parts and details of the exhibit are securely fastened in place or

in a secured environment. Be sure entry is in correct section and class. Wall mounted displays must have hanging hardware.

9. Judging results submitted by judges and department superintendents are considered final.
10. Exhibitors submitting five entries will receive one 1-day admission to the Fair.
11. Ribbons will be awarded according to merit. All items are judged against items in the same class. Each class will be awarded one blue, one red, and one white ribbon.
12. No previous blue ribbon winning Hobbies and Collectible entries from the Coconino County Fair are eligible to be judged again, but may be brought in for display only.

 - f. Animals may be entered in only one halter class division.
 - g. Large classes may be divided for judging at the request of the judge. Only one set of awards for the entire class will be given.
 - h. Animals may not be moved from one class to another after judging has begun (except at the judge's discretion).
 - i. Exhibitors are responsible for being at the show tent 10 minutes prior to scheduled time of their class.
 - j. Handler attire should be conservative, neat and appropriate for the class. Shoes should be appropriate for the show ring (open-toed shoes, sandals and bare feet will disqualify the exhibitor). Suggested attire is dark pants and white shirt or blouse with nothing hanging from pockets.
 - k. Once in the ring, handler may not switch animal

being shown, which will result in dismissal from the ring.

l. The name of the handler and the name of the animal must match the names on the entry form.

4. All Junior Camelid exhibitors must be 4-H members in good standing and enrolled in a camelid project.

The health certificate must state that they are not infected with Blue-tongue, nor exposed to scrapie, or originate from a scrapie infected or source flock. All goats will be checked by the Show Veterinarian at check-in before entering any livestock areas. All goats must be free of parasites, abscesses, ulcerations, ringworm, not under any quarantine, and not recently exposed to any infectious or contagious disease. Any animal deemed unfit by the Show Veterinarian or the Superintendent must be immediately removed from the fairgrounds by the exhibitor.

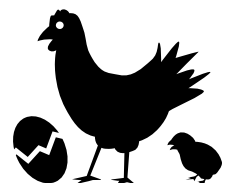

- General Livestock Rules and 4-H Livestock Rules apply.**
- All exhibitors are required to show their specific species (rabbit, cavy or both) in their specified class for showmanship.
- All Junior 4-H exhibitors must sign up for barn duty for post-fair barn clean-up, unless barn is cleaned immediately following the close of the Fair on Monday. If needed, date will be determined by barn superintendent.
- Rabbits and Cavies entered in the Junior 4-H department will be judged by the standards set forth by the American Rabbit and Cavy Breeders' Association (ARBA).
- When filling out entry form, please add one entry simply for showmanship. Add a separate entry for the breed and variety of your animal. Therefore, if you are only doing showmanship, you would have one entry for showmanship in the appropriate class and one entry for your animal for a total of 2 entries on the entry form.
- All exhibitors are required to show their own animals.
- All animals must have identification. For rabbits, a tattoo or sharpie identification in the left ear of the rabbit. For cavies, an ear ring with identifying information.
- All rabbits and cavies brought to the judging table should be properly groomed. Grooming facilities will be available in rabbit building. Bring your own grooming supplies.
- Wool entries for Angora Rabbits – see Club Work department.

- Sale signs may go up starting Sunday at 9 a.m.
- NO animal is allowed to leave the barn without the JR. Rabbit Superintendent's approval.
- All 4-H members are responsible for cleaning up their own pens for their rabbits before checking rabbits out on Monday. This rule holds true for every rabbit entered in the barn belonging to that exhibitor.
- All rabbit and cavy sales and exchanges MUST take place OUTSIDE of the barn, only after the exhibitor has completed the check out process and checked out the animals that they checked in.
- All market animals must be entered as market only.
- All Doe and litter must be entered only as Doe and litter and not by specific breed.
- Doe and litter – The litter must be at least 6 weeks old to be entered in the barn and no more than 12 weeks old to qualify for Doe and Litter.

Market Rabbit Rules

- All exhibitors must show in showmanship in order to have a meat pen entered in the 4-H JR. Rabbit Department.
- All 4-H exhibitors must be registered with NAJLA (Northern Arizona Junior Livestock Association) by the appropriate deadline.
- All 4-H exhibitors must adhere to the NAJLA and Junior Livestock rules listed in the Fair Book and must have signed the agreements provided by NAJLA.
- Meat pens are to consist of three rabbits, no more than 10 weeks old. Each rabbit must weigh between 3 1/2 & 5 1/2 pounds.
- All rabbits must be weighed in by the Weighing Committee. Official weights are recorded and given to the Junior Rabbit Superintendent. If any one of the three rabbits in the pen are overweight or underweight, the entire meat pen will be eliminated.
- The three qualities, in the order of their importance, for judging meat pens are as follows:
 - Meat type
 - Condition
 - Uniformity which consists of: weight, size, appearance, condition and meat type, as prescribed in the ARBA Standard of Perfection book.
- All meat pens will be weighed in upon arrival. Check with Superintendent as to when and where that will occur.
- Meat pens must have been entirely raised by exhibitor.

Department Rules

- 1. General Livestock Rules and 4-H Livestock Rules apply.**
- All ownership deadlines will be observed. All market sheep must be owned by the 4-H member. Breeding sheep may be co-owned or leased, but must be under the daily care of the 4-H member for the required time. Sheep may be shown by only one exhibitor and those animals must be under the daily care of only one 4-H member.
- Neutered animals may not be shown in breeding classes.
- Sheep that are not entered in the Fair will not be allowed on the fairgrounds without prior approval from CCPR as an exhibition.
- All sheep must be inspected by the Show Veterinarian at the fair before entering any livestock areas.
- In-State Sheep: Livestock Inspection Papers (hauling papers) must accompany all in-state sheep exhibits and must be turned in to the Superintendent or Livestock inspector. All sheep must be checked by the Show Veterinarian at the fair before entering any livestock areas. All sheep must not be infected with Bluetongue, nor exposed to scrapie, nor originate from a scrapie infected source or flock.
- All sheep must be free of parasites, abscesses or ulcerations, and ringworm; not under any quarantine; and not recently exposed to any infectious or contagious disease. Any animal deemed unfit by the veterinarian must be immediately removed from the fairgrounds by the exhibitor.
- Sheep will not be accepted if their tails have been

surgically removed. If prolapse occurs during the Fair, a veterinarian will be called at the sheep owner's expense. Veterinarian recommendations will be followed.

- Each 4-H Club is expected to have representatives in the Sheep Barn to meet the public and share educational information about Sheep. There will be a sign-up sheet available for this Barn Duty beginning at 7 p.m. Thursday evening. Exhibitors will sign up several times for Barn Duty depending on how many members are exhibiting. More than one member will be on duty at a time. Educational exhibits are encouraged; please make arrangements ahead of time with the Superintendent.
- Exhibitors will maintain their pen and surrounding area for a public and educational setting. Aisles must be kept neat and clean at all times.
- Animal pens must be cleaned and animals must be fed no later than 8:30 a.m. every morning.
- Sheep must be shown with all four feet on the ground.
- Muzzles may be used on an animal only if the exhibitor creates an educational poster about the purpose and proper use of muzzles. The poster must be displayed in the animal's pen.
- Flock and Pair exhibits: Animals entered and shown in Flock and Pair Classes must be owned by and under the daily care of the exhibitor. Each animal must be entered as an individual, and only one Flock or Pair entry is allowed.
- Lambs must be slick shorn prior to receiving at the fair. Trimming may be done at the fair but only by the exhibitor.
- Mats and/or carpets will be allowed ONLY if they can be secured and kept in place.
- The Superintendent reserves the right to combine limited entry classes.
- Base date for ages of livestock can be found in the General Livestock Rules.

Market & Breeding Sheep Rules

- All Market and Breeding Lambs will be exhibited slick shorn.
- A Veterinarian will have the option to mouth and sift any obviously over-aged lambs. All eight lamb teeth must be in place.
- After weigh-in, market and breeding lambs will be divided into equitable weight classes for judging.

WEIGHT LIMITS: The maximum weight for Market Swine is 325 pounds, the minimum weight is 225 pounds.

Department Rules

1. General Livestock Rules and 4-H Livestock Rules apply.
2. Junior Market swine exhibitors must have a current Youth Livestock Quality Assurance Certificate.
3. Swine Classification Procedures:
 - a. Market swine will be divided into classes by breed. There must be at least four entries to create a breed class. Please see Breed Classification Standards at the end of this section. Superintendent will combined classes as needed.
 - b. Exhibitors will identify the breed of their swine in the description column on the on-line form.
 - c. This is a Market Show. Breed Classification will be confirmed at time of weigh-in by superintendent and/or Classifier. Classification of swine is final.
 - d. At receiving, all swine must be clean and groomed so that all breed characteristics are visible. The Superintendent and Breed Classifier have the right to request an animal be washed before it is classified.
4. Swine must not be scaly, have excessively dry skin, sunburned, or any unsightly condition. Swine not show ring groomed and clean will be sifted. Feet must be trimmed if needed.
5. No feed is to be stored in barn area or in empty pens unless approved by the Superintendent.
6. Pens must be cleaned each day of the Fair by 9:30 a.m. Wood shavings or pellets should be kept reasonably dry and free of manure throughout the Fair.
7. All feeding should be completed by 9:30 a.m. and feed pans removed from pens by 9:30 a.m.
8. Watering should be monitored throughout the day. Automatic watering devices are allowed, but not mandatory. Automatic waterers that leak must be removed

from pen.

9. Due to space limitations, each exhibitor is only allowed to enter one swine in this Department.
10. Water is the only compound that may be applied to hogs. Oil and paint are not allowed and if used, will be grounds for disqualification.
11. Hogs must be bedded on shavings/pellets only. Exhibitors must supply all bedding for their hog(s).
12. Exhibitors should write their name on all feed and equipment; bags, buckets, feeders, etc.
13. Exhibitors must drive their hog to the show ring without using a crate walker. Crate walkers are only to be used to load your hog into the scale during weigh-in or to the wash rack, no exceptions. Training your hog to drive is an essential part of your hog project and should be done prior to the Fair.
14. **Exhibitors are expected to be in the holding pen with their hog prior to the start of their respective class. Shows will not be held for an exhibitor or their hog. It is the sole responsibility of the exhibitor to be in the holding pen with their hog on time; parental assistance is encouraged.**
15. **Coaching an exhibitor during the market or showmanship show is not allowed. You will be asked to leave the show if observed coaching an exhibitor.**
16. Awards won in the Swine Barn may be displayed above your individual pen. Only awards given by the Swine Barn will be displayed.

Breed Classification Standards

Berkshire

1. Black and white with erect ears exhibiting Berkshire character.
2. A Berkshire must have white on all four legs, face and tail (unless tail is docked). One of the white leg points may also be missing.
3. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
4. A Berkshire must NOT have a solid white or a solid black face from ears forward.
5. A Berkshire must NOT have a solid black nose (rim of nose).
6. White is allowed on the ears, but NO solid white may appear on the ears.
7. Occasional splash of white may appear on the body.

Chester White

1. Must possess Chester White Breed characteristics.
2. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
3. Must be solid white in color, no color on the skin larger than a silver dollar, no colored hair.
4. Any skin pigmentation other than white that exceeds five in number is disqualified.
5. Ears must be down and medium size.
6. Any signs of weighted ear tags or evidence of past existence of such ear tags is not permissible and is grounds for disqualification.

Duroc

1. Must be red in color and possess Duroc Breed character, ears must be down and medium in size.
2. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
3. Must NOT have any white hair located on the animal.
4. Must NOT have any black hair.
5. Must NOT have more than three black spots on the skin and none of these spots can be larger than two inches in diameter.
6. Must NOT have any shading or indication of a belt.

Hampshire

1. Must be black in color with a white belt starting on the front leg. The belt may partially or totally encircle the body.
2. Must possess Hampshire Breed character, meaning ears must be erect and not rounded.
3. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
4. Must NOT have any white hair or indications of streaking on the forehead.
5. Must NOT have any red hair.

Hereford

1. The ideal color markings shall be red, light, or dark, however, deep red is preferred with a white head, ears, and at least 2 white feet.
2. At least 50% white face, at least 50% red body.
3. Ears must be at least broke forward and medium size.
4. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.

Landrace

1. Must be white in color and possess Landrace Breed character, meaning ears must be down.
2. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
3. Must NOT have any color hair other than white.
4. Must NOT have more than three spots of skin pigmentation.
5. Must NOT have any spot of skin pigmentation larger than one U.S. minted quarter.

Poland China

1. Must possess Poland China Breed characteristics.
2. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
3. Must be black with six white points (face, feet and switch) with an occasional splash of white on the body. A hog may not possess more than one solid black leg and be determined as Poland China.
4. Must have ears down.
5. Must not have evidence of a belt formation.
6. Cannot have red or sandy hair and/or pigmentation.
7. Hogs that have weighted ear tags or evidence of tampering of ears with possible ear tags are ineligible.

Note: Tail docking is permissible.

Spotted Swine

1. Must be black and white.
2. Must possess Spotted Breed characteristics.
3. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
4. Ears cannot be erect.
5. Any red tinted or brown spots are ineligible.
6. No solid black head from ears forward.
7. No distinct white belt pattern (hair or skin) encircling and extending down and onto each shoulder.
8. Any signs of weighted ear tags or evidence of passed existence of such tags are determined ineligible and are grounds for disqualification.

Tamworth

1. Must be red in color (no more than 5% black hair) and possess Tamworth Breed Character.
2. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
3. Except for hooves, no white should appear on the body.
4. Dark spots with general appearance of pinpricks or speckling on the skin ONLY are typical of the breed.
5. Must not show if ears extend less than 65 degrees from the head.
6. Ears should be pointed, uprights, and give the appearance of alertness.

Yorkshire

1. Must be white in color and possess Yorkshire Breed characteristics, meaning ears must be erect.
2. Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
3. Must NOT have any colored hair other than white.
4. Must NOT have colored skin pigmentation larger than one U.S. minted silver dollar.
5. Must NOT have masking above the eyes larger than a U.S. minted silver dollar.

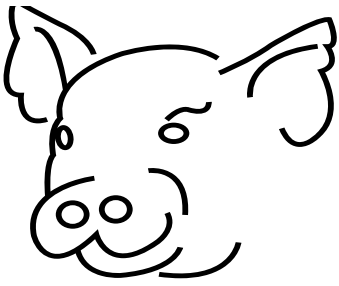

Department Rules

1. All General Fair Rules, Livestock Rules, Open Livestock Rules, and the National Show Ring Code of Ethics for Coconino County apply.
2. This Department is open to out-of-county residents, however, preference is given to Coconino County residents.
3. Only one entry per class for each breed.
4. The Fair will provide coops, feeding and cleaning. All eggs become property of the Coconino County Fair and vitality will be destroyed.
5. Judging will be by comparison, in accordance with the American Poultry Association Standard of Perfection and the American Bantam Standard.
6. The terms "cock" and "hen" are defined as birds hatched prior to January 1, 2023. The terms "cockerel" and "pullet" are birds hatched after January 1, 2023. A trio consists of one male and two females of any age, but the same breed and variety.

Entrants need not be members of the American Rabbit Breeders Association (ARBA) to enter rabbits or cavies. Anyone owning an animal of an ARBA-recognized breed may enter that animal in the ARBA-sanctioned show, provided it has an identifying ear tattoo. Mixed breed as well as purebred rabbits and cavies are accepted for entry into the non-ARBA pet class, and do not need ear tattoos.

Department Rules

1. All General Fair Rules, Livestock Rules, Open Livestock Rules, and the National Show Ring Code of Ethics for Coconino County will apply.
2. All breeds and varieties recognized by ARBA will accepted for entry. Those under a working standard will also be accepted and judged, provided the entrant gives a copy of the official Working Standard to the Superintendent prior to judging. However, animals under a working standard may not qualify for all awards.
3. The Coconino County Fair is a member of the American Rabbit Breeders Association. This show will be governed and run by the current official rules of ARBA. The judge's decisions will be final.
4. This is an Official ARBA Sanctioned Show. The ARBA Executive Director is Eric Stewart, P.O. Box 400, Knox, PA 16232, www.arba.net. Membership Dues: Individual: \$20 per year, \$50 for 3 years. Husband/Wife: \$30 per year, \$75 for 3 years. Youth \$12 per year, \$30 for 3 years. The ARBA National Convention will be held Oct. 21st to Oct. 25th 2023 at the Kentucky Expo Center
5. Entries will be limited according to space available. This department is open to both in-county and out-of-county residents. Preference will be given to Coconino

County residents. Exhibitors will be notified if any of their entries are not accepted.

6. All rabbits entered in ARBA Sanctioned Show must have a permanent tattoo mark in the left ear. Cavies may be marked with a metal tag.
7. Exhibitors may enter more than one (1) animal in any one class.
8. Absolutely no animals will be released from their cages without permission of the Superintendent. Nothing is to be placed on or in cages without permission of Superintendent.
9. The Coconino County Fair will provide pens, feeding, and general care of the exhibitors' animals. All exhibitors are requested to volunteer at least one morning or evening of barn duty during the run of the fair. A sign up sheet will be available at check-in.
10. The Department Superintendent will be in charge of stock entered for exhibition. Coconino County employees and volunteers will in no case be responsible for any loss or damage which may occur, and entries are made with this accepted condition.
11. The Fair is not responsible for animals left after specified release times.
12. Youth (under the age of 18) may enter in both the open and youth show with different animals, but the same animal cannot be entered in both shows.
13. For Sale signs will be no larger than a 8.5"x11" sheet of paper and may not be posted until Sunday after 10 a.m. You may also enter a dollar amount on the entry tag.
14. If an exhibitor sells an animal during the run of the Fair, that animal will be released by the Superintendent at the specified release time to the registered exhibitor only. The exhibitor must conduct the transaction and exchange of the animal outside of the barn building.

Breed Entries: Please list sex, breed, and variety under description. Classes will be provided for all ARBA recognized breeds and those under an ARBA working standard.

Meat Pens: Pen of three (3) fryers, 3-5 lbs. Each, of the same breed and variety, up to 10 weeks old. Underweight or overweight rabbits within the pen will cause the whole pen to be disqualified. All meat pens will be weighed just prior to judging under the supervision of the judge.

Doe and Litter: Each doe and litter entry shall consist of one (1) doe and no more than eight (8) kits. Kits will be no younger than five (5) weeks and no older than eight (8) weeks of age.

Breed Fur: All rabbits entered in fur classes must be entered in general competition.

Department Rules

1. All General Fair Rules apply.
2. **Please fill out Entry Form C or Enter Online.**
3. Open to all schools in Coconino County. A school's exhibit display must be submitted by school personnel. **All entries must be part of a school's exhibit display. Any club, team, classroom, or school program can enter a display in the Schools Building; a school should develop a display which showcases what they believe to be the best parts of their school. A school may submit more than one entry.**
4. **Each student made item should be labeled with student's first name and grade level. All school displays must fit within the provided area (see illustration below).** School personnel must provide all materials needed to assemble display.
5. All exhibits must be completed by 6 p.m. the **TUESDAY** before the 1st day of the Fair.
6. Exhibits cannot be changed or taken down before 4 p.m. on the last day of the Fair. All displays must be removed by school personnel between 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. on Monday, the last day of the Fair. All displays must be removed completely and the display area must be left as you found it.
7. Four schools with the best display will receive a \$50 award and a rosette. The display will not be judged on quality or quantity of items displayed but rather judged by the overall appearance of the school's display.
8. As long as space allows, all entries will be displayed. Entries found offensive in any way will not be exhibited. The Fair is a family event. The Department Superintendents will make the decision.



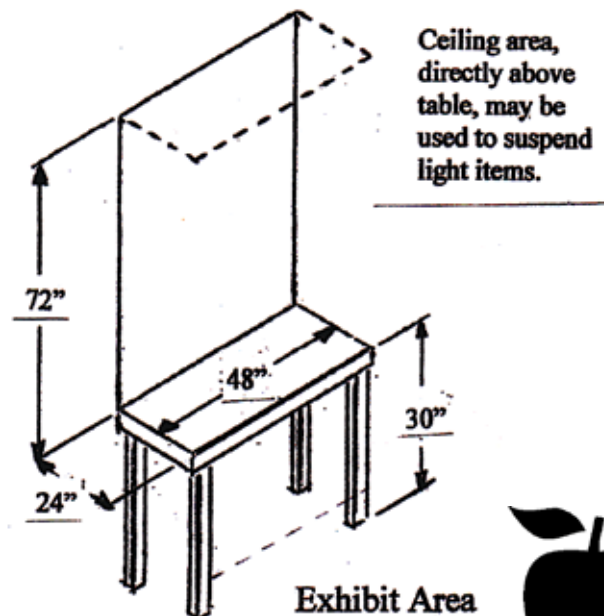
